## **Text-Dependent Questions**

- 1. Why did the owners have their teams if they didn't make much money on them?
- 2. Based on the food allowance the players received per day, could the players at least sometimes afford two "decent meals" a day?
- Describe the issues faced by Negro baseball players. Use evidence from the text to support your answer.
- 4. List the words and phrases used to describe the Negro League owners. From these words and phrases what can you determine about the owners? Support your answer with evidence from the text.
- 5. What did the players do to get more money?
- 6. How did the teams save money?
- 7. The author uses the words "unrestricted free agent." What does it mean to be an unrestricted free agent?
- 8. What are the similarities and differences between the Negro baseball league and the major league? Use evidence from the text to support your thoughts.
- 9. What is the main idea of each paragraph?

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## **Performance Tasks for Informational Texts**

Students compare and contrast a firsthand account of African American ballplayers in the Negro Leagues to a secondhand account of their treatment found in books such as Kadir Nelson's *We Are the Ship: The Story of Negro League Baseball*, attending to the focus of each account and the information provided by each.
