Activities	 Ask the students what they know about the swine flu. Pass out the article. Pronounce the new words at the bottom of the page. Make sure there are plenty of dictionaries available. Read each paragraph or sentence for the students. Stop and use dictionaries and pictures for unknown words. Have one of the students reread the sentence/paragraph. Discuss /time students rubbing their hands for 20 seconds Discuss the elbow choice over a person's hand. Have the students take turns matching the new words. Pass out the true and false sheet. Have the students choose the answer and make corrections.

Here Comes The Swine Flu

The swine flu, its official name is H1N1 in**flu**enza, could make millions of Americans sick. During the winter, many people could catch the flu from other humans, not pigs.

Is the flu only in the United States? No, more than 100 countries around the world are reporting new cases of the swine flu. Since this disease is all over the world or globe, it is called a global pandemic. It's the first such flu pandemic in 41 years.

There have been more than 2,800 deaths reported so far. The people most likely to be very sick or die from the swine flu would probably be under the age of 25, pregnant women, and weak people.

Most people will have nothing more than fever, body aches, a sore throat, a runny nose, and, in about half the cases, stomach problems. Since the swine flu is caused by a virus, a tiny germ, an antibiotic won't help you get well. A flu injection or shot should keep you from getting the flu.

The best way to protect yourself from the flu is to do the following: First, wash your hands often, scrubbing at least 20 seconds. Second, when you sneeze, cover your nose and mouth with a tissue or sneeze into your elbow, not your hands. Third, stay home until your fever has stopped for at least 24 hours.
